

Andrew's New Book (What Should Have Happened)

Chapter One - Opening at the One Level

Deal 6 Open 1NT with 5332s with a five-card major.

Opening 1NT with a 5332 shape and a fivecard minor *(see last deal)* is one thing, but how about opening 1NT with a five-card major? My strongly held view - having played and taught this for many years - is still to open 1NT.

Exercise: With which of these hands should you open 1NT?

(a)*(b)* (c)AQ1074 A082 A J 8 6 3 ¥ A K 8 6 3 ¥ J 3 2 ♥ J 3 10 2 A Q 2 ♦ Q J 7 3 ♣ K J 9 * 104 ♣ K 2 (a). No - two doubletons. (b). Yes. (c). Yes.

How the Deal was Bid

1♠ (1)	Pass	2♣	Pass
2	Pass	4♠ (2)	End

(1) I strongly recommend a 1NT opening here.


(2) Places partner with six spades, so raises to game in the presumed eight-card fit. 3NT looks frightening without a stopper in hearts.

Contract: 4♠ by South Opening Lead: ♦9

What happened

West led $\diamond 9$ against the $4 \diamond$ game. East won $\diamond A$ and found the excellent switch to hearts (dummy's weakest suit), choosing $\forall K$ (top from two). When this held, he followed with $\diamond 6$. West won $\diamond A$ and led $\diamond 5$ for East to ruff. Declarer won $\diamond 2$ switch with $\diamond K$, crossed to $\diamond K$, then led $\diamond 4$. East discarded and declarer had to concede two further trump tricks to West remaining $\diamond Q109$. Down three. The main advantage of this style is that when you open and repeat a suit, you almost certainly have six cards. Take the (uncontested) auction 1 - 2 - 2. The only time that you would have fewer than six spades would be a 5-3-3-2 hand (a 5-4 shape would introduce the four-card suit). If you open 1NT with the 5-3-3-2 shape, then the auction 1 - 2 - 2guarantees six (+) spades.

How the Deal should be Bid



What should have happened

West would have led $\forall 4$ against 3NT. East wins $\forall K$, returns $\forall 6$ to $\forall A$ and declarer wins $\forall 7$ with $\forall Q$. The best chance by far of making 3NT is to flush out $\diamond A$, hoping it is with East (with no hearts left). $\diamond K$ goes to East's (phew!) $\diamond A$, $\Rightarrow J$ return (say) is won by $\Rightarrow Q$, then $\diamond AK$, $\Rightarrow AK$ and $\diamond QJ10$ are cashed. Nine tricks and game made.

If you remember just one thing...

Open 1NT with a 5332 shape and 12-14 points, even when the five-card suit is a major.

The bluebells were just appearing – normally they are in full bloom for this first May Bank Holiday but the cold February had seen to that – and a wonderful Spring was in the air. I stopped off for a bite in Moreton-in-the-Marsh and quickly read the bidding system. Did such-and-such a sequence really mean that, I kept thinking. Why hadn't I swotted up earlier? (from left) Alexander, Tony, Andrew (hirsute after



a bicyling fall prevented shaving!), and David

Teammates - our own Bridge star David partnering Daily Telegraph's Tony Forrester and partner Alexander Allfrey (who with Suzy Lewis helps to run our Dorset/Wiltshire offshoot, now relocated at the Lamb, Hindon) - were also converging in on Shakespearean territory. Not that we'd have any time to see any Plays. Making correct plays at the Bridge table was the order of the day.


Teammates all complained (except for David) of being similarly undercooked and we began slowly, only narrowly winning our early matches. But we played better and better, and one win followed another. Could we rid the ghost of past Spring Fours' calamities? (This event – Britain's premier knock-out event held at one venue – has not been kind to us in recent years). By Andrew



A loud water heater outside my bedroom window ensured an early start each morning. A full English breakfast – essential with a long Bridge day ahead - was followed by a solo stroll along the charming River Avon, replete with wildlife. Refreshed, it was down to business.

And business was good, for we made the final, relatively comfortably in the end. The final, however, was a different matter. Taking place on the Tuesday of the Bank Holiday weekend, there is always a morning-after feel to the Spring Fours final. Few tourists remain and most Bridge players have also left. Just nervous finalists are still left - eyeing each other up.

We begin poorly. We lose points steadily. A dribble not a torrent, but with 24 of the 32 deals gone, we are 30-odd imps in arrears (that's about three game swings). The first board of the last stanza is a flat 3NT, then I have an unsavoury 1NT contract to play (see deal)



West cashes the ace of spades (would I have risen with dummy's queen on a low spade lead?), then leads a low spade. I rise with dummy's queen, then successfully lead a heart to my jack. Still searching for extra

tricks, and with no hurry to test for a 3-3 heart split (if they are 3-3, they'll always be 3-3), I lead the queen of diamonds.

West grabs the ace of diamonds and cashes three spades. Both dummy and I throw two clubs, whilst East throws two diamonds, and then the nine of clubs. West now switches to the queen of clubs, to East's king and my ace. I cash the ace-king of hearts in the hope of a 3-3 split, but West discards (a club) on the third round. Now what?

Over 1000 people are watching live on the internet (Bridge Base online) and I can feel their tension. Making rather heavy weather of it, I eventually do the right thing, exiting with a fourth heart. East wins his queen but his last two cards are the jack-nine of diamonds, from which he has to lead around to dummy's kingten.

Seven tricks and part-score made – not a huge swing but a change in momentum. Alexander and I go plus on all the last eight deals, David and Tony look hopeful as we return to score and – would you believe it that by picking up five such small part-score swings we have won the match by one imp. One imp! That's one overtrick. Phew!

Caroline and others at the Club assure me it was truly nail-biting. Although we did not know how close it was at the table (for we do not know our teammates' results until afterwards), we sigh a collective sigh of relief.

The jinx is over – we have won the Spring Foursomes.



Getting to ARBC.

How easy is it to get to the Bridge Club?... Very easy here's how.

1. Our favourite way - walking - or like Andrew and many of his team - why not cycle?

We actively encourage all our members to either walk or cycle into the Club. There is cycle parking located to the side of the Club, and also by the entrance to Parsons Green Underground Station.

2. Public Transport - another fine option and easier than you may think.

Tube – Parsons Green Station is less than a minute's walk from the club. The station is on the Wimbledon branch of the District Line and trains run every 10 minutes.

Bus – The No 14 stops on the Fulham Road, near the top of Parsons Green Lane. The service links Putney Heath to Tottenham Court Road Station. Daytime frequency is every 6-8 minutes and night time frequency is every 12 minutes. The 414 also goes down the Fulham Road up to Edgware Road. The No 22 stops on the New Kings Road, near the bottom of Parsons Green Lane. The service links Putney Common to Piccadilly Circus. Daytime frequency is every 7-10 minutes and night time frequency is every 12 minutes.

3. Taxis/mini-cabs

The Club loves members using local taxi and mini-cabs rather than their cars. If you would like to book a cab, there are several numbers of local firms displayed on the notice board in reception; alternatively ask a member of staff.


4. Private Cars

We would like to discourage you from driving to the Club. The local residents are understandably very concerned about increasing the number of cars in an already congested area. In particular, please avoid parking on the Residents Bays that double up as Pay and Display in the streets between the Club and the Fulham Road. If you must drive, please try car-sharing. The Bridge Club has 12 of its own spaces in the yard just next to the Club (clearly marked).

• After 5pm you can park free on yellow lines in the side streets and on Resident Bays.

• After 6.30 pm you can park on the yellow line, on the far side of the Parsons Green Lane, from the chip shop opposite the club up to the Fulham Road.

• The remaining yellow lines on Parsons Green Lane are off-limit until 8pm.
